

Or bike through the Acadian Peninsula along an impressive 610 km (379 mile) biking trail: the **Véloroute** de la Péninsule acadienne (VPA). The Acadians' love for life is infectious – come for a visit and you'll find yourself welcomed with open arms into the festivals, gatherings and homes of L'Acadie.



WORLD'S HIGHEST TIDES THE PHENOMENAL BAY OF FUNDY

Comparable only to the Amazon in marine biodiversity and sharing a border with the U.S. state of Maine, New Brunswick's side of the Bay of Fundy is the unspoiled, serene adventure travel mecca of Atlantic Canada. A visit to this special place will reward you with the world's highest tides plus billion-year-old coastlines and every kind of experience.

The **Fundy Coastal Drive**, shouldering the phenomenal Bay of Fundy, offers a rare pocket of scenic splendour that's home to one of the planet's best collections of migratory whales and birds and marine mammals. It is also the feeding ground for the protected and legendary sea giant, the rare North Atlantic Right whale.

Don't Miss! The Hopewell Rocks, Cape Enrage, Alma, Fundy National Park, Fundy Trail Parkway and the Fundy Isles Archipelago.

CAN YOU GETAWAY AT HEARST LODGE?

Few places on earth are as awe-inspiring as the **Fundy Coastal Drive** starting with **The Hopewell Rocks**, proudly boasting the best place to experience the highest tides in the world (up to 16 m / 52.5 ft.), which rise and fall twice a day, every day. Here, you can walk on the ocean floor and six hours later kayak on the very same spot, during the day or at night with the starry sky as a backdrop.

Walk, bike or hike along the **Fundy Trail Parkway** to a cozy getaway at the Hearst Lodge and cabins or camp in a yurt in **Fundy National Park**. Find your perfect camping gateway in our many provincial and national parks and explore the New Brunswick wilderness on your terms. Visit the red sandstone sea caves carved into 250-million-year-old rocks by the powerful tide in **Fundy-St. Martins** and plan a stay at the beautiful, new boutique hotel, Beach Street Inn.

Or explore incredible seaside towns and island life before you head out onto the Bay for breathtaking wildlife excursions in the **Fundy Isles Archipelago**.

Explore the **River Valley Scenic Drive** along the majestic Saint John River. Known as "The Rhine of North America" (673 km / 420 mi) it flows through the provincial capital of **Fredericton** and empties right into the Bay of Fundy at the city of **Saint John**.

Following every twist and bend of our world-famous
Atlantic salmon fly-fishing river, the **Miramichi River Route** takes travellers through centuries of our Indigenous,
Irish and Scottish history. The storytelling and lore
are legendary.

CULTURALLY VIBRANT - ON THE EDGE OF NATURE

With historic city streets, a plethora of world-class restaurants, charming boutiques and art galleries, and the beautiful Bay of Fundy on its doorstep, **Saint John** is a vibrant city full of urban adventure on the edge of nature. The Bay of Fundy, home to the world's highest tides, offers excitement and thrills in the heart of the city with the AREA 506 Waterfront Container Village, tidal steps and four-season patios at Ihtoli-maqahamok (The Gathering Space), and the Reversing Falls Rapids. Part of the Stonehammer UNESCO Global Geopark, Saint John - Canada's first incorporated city (1785), acts as the perfect home-base for daytrips along the Fundy Coast to Fundy-St. Martins and the Fundy Trail Provincial Park.



Discover the vibrant charm of Moncton-Dieppe, an ideal "Hub and Spoke" destination nestled in the heart of the Maritime provinces, positioned between the Fundy and Acadian coasts. Moncton-Dieppe blends English and French Acadian cultures, combining waterside with urban charm, providing easy access to some of New Brunswick's top experiences. Immerse yourself in ultimate relaxation at USVA Spa Nordik, expand your culinary knowledge with a handson cocktail and culinary class at Brix Experience, or savour the diverse flavours from our array of modern Acadian to international dishes. Explore urban art on a city mural tour or indulge in award-winning wines with a tasting at Magnetic Hill Winery. Don't forget to witness the natural wonder of the Tidal Bore, where the incredible force of the Bay of Fundy pushes against the flow of the Petitcodiac River, causing a thick wave of water to roll upstream along the coast of the two cities, twice daily, showcasing nature's awe-inspiring power.



...TO DARK SKY PRESERVES & GREAT SAND DUNES

The **Appalachian Range Route** entices you to hike **Mount Carleton** (820 m / 2,690 ft), the highest summit in the Canadian Maritimes. It's also part of the **International Appalachian Trail** and a recognized **Dark-Sky Preserve**. Nearby, guided canoe trips explore the pristine **Restigouche River**, a designated Canadian Heritage River. Serenity now.

The Irving Eco-Centre, La Dune de Bouctouche along the Acadian Coastal Drive was developed to preserve and restore one of the few remaining great sand dunes (12 km/7.5 mi) on the northeastern coastline of North America. This spectacular natural setting is protected by a boardwalk with beach access. A rich variety of marine and aquatic plants, animals, shorebirds and other migratory birds, make the dune their habitat.



The Fredericton Capital Region is a destination rooted in history and nature. Home to the Wolastoqiyik for thousands of years, followed by Acadian and Loyalist settlement, discover the Wolastoq (Saint John River) at the heart of the region, creating a natural playground for all to explore. The river weaves through the city and connects communities, complemented by an amazing trail network. Discover a vibrant music, arts and craft scene with world-class festivals, art galleries and markets. Explore our Taproom Trail, National Historic Sites, outdoor adventures, and several new tours and experiences like Dumfries Maple Experience, Coffee tours, curator tour of the Beaverbrook Art Gallery and Maritime Kitchen Party to name a few.

The beloved town of St. Andrews-bythe Sea anchors the western portion of the Bay of Fundy with its pedestrianfriendly downtown filled with colourful shops and a lively wharf. Your clients can treat themselves to a luxurious stay at the Algonquin Resort, famous for being one of Canada's historic Grand Railway Hotels. They can surround themselves with beauty at the wonderful Kingsbrae Garden and explore its many themed gardens and sculptures or take a trip across the ocean floor - by car - on the way to Ministers Island, the former home of Canadian Pacific Railway baron Willian Van Horne.

Looking for an island escape? Explore the Fundy Isles -- a world apart from the mainland yet just a ferry ride away. Grand Manan Island is a 90-minute ride to rugged cliffs and



shorelines guarded by lighthouses and teeming with birds and marine life. On Watch in awe as these giants breach, Campobello Island visit the heritage cottage and grounds of Roosevelt Campobello International Park. For more beautiful coastal vistas, artisan and art studios, and excellent sea kayaking, head to Deer Island, a short 20-minute ferry ride from Letete, near St. George.



New Brunswick is a haven for more than a dozen whale species, including humpbacks, finbacks, minkes and the endangered North Atlantic right whale. Grand Manan, Campobello and St. Andrews are known for their incredible whale watching excursions. roll and gracefully sink below the ocean's surface.

With stunning views of the world-renowned Bay of Fundy, the park has been carved out of the Fundy escarpment, one of the last remaining coastal wilderness areas between Florida and Labrador. With the connector route now completed, you can easily access this beautiful park through St. Martins, Sussex Corner, and Fundy


Martins to view the famous Sea Caves, sandstone caves shaped by the Bay of Fundy and accessible over the ocean floor only during low tide. Arriving at high tide? Book a kayaking adventure to explore the caves and coastline from a different perspective.


While your clients are visiting the Southern coast, they need to check out Fundy National Park and its breathtaking wilderness backdrop. New Brunswick's first National Park, set up with a choice of five campgrounds, they will explore over 120 km (74.5 mi) of walking and hiking trails, and discover the richness of the Acadian forest. Nearby Fundy National Park are Cape Enrage and the Hopewell Rocks, two breathtaking destinations that demonstrate the power and allure of the world's highest tides.

Beauty is not limited to the Southern part of our province- head North and stop at Mount Carleton Provincial Park, where your clients can hike the highest mountain in the Maritime provinces. With 11 trails ranging from wheelchair-accessible to challenging mountain hikes, this provincial park and campground offers something for all nature-lovers. On a clear day, visitors can see 10 million trees from Mount Carleton's highest peak!

If rich history mixed with beautiful scenery is of interest, we suggest your clients take a drive along the Eastern part of our province, referred to as the Acadian Coast. Along this beautiful coastal drive is a 750 km (466 mi) excursion that takes you into the heart of the rich, spirited, and historic Acadian culture. This part of our province also boasts some of New Brunswick's most beautiful beaches, which are some of the warmest sandy beaches in all of Canada. From Shediac (the lobster capital of the world), to Bouctouche, to Miramichi, to the

Acadian Peninsula and to the Chaleur region; there are no shortage of sights and experiences to take in along this beautiful route. If they are exploring the Acadian Coast of our province, a must-stop is Kouchibouguac National Park. Golden sand dunes, estuaries brimming with life, warm ocean beaches, Mi'kmaq and Acadian culture, the starry spectacle of a Dark Sky Preserve and snowbound winter activities are just some of the many things to experience within this beautiful national park.


HISTORY

History lives in the present. The events, ideas, and people of the past have shaped what our lives look like today. Through architecture and landscape, the stories of New Brunswick's people and cultures come alive for your clients to experience. Indigenous peoples have inhabited the region for thousands of years, a story told by the many artifacts found across the province.

Get the true experience of
New Brunswick's past at our living
history museums. They will take
in 200 years of history at New
Brunswick's Acadie at Village
Historique Acadien, an incredible
complex built around a 2.2 km (1.3
mi) circuit bordered with historic
buildings, all inhabited by fully
bilingual (French and English)
interpretive guides who portray the
daily lives of the Acadian people.

They can immerse themselves further in Acadian history at Pays de la Sagouine, a theatrical village that opened in 1992 on a small natural island in the middle of Bouctouche Bay. This unique tourist attraction is centred around the imagination of the great Acadian author, Antonine Maillet, who gives life to many characters through playwriting. Visitors come here to experience the true Acadien joie de vivre.

Looking for more historical enrichment? Kings Landing Historical Settlement, near Fredericton, is a 300-acre open-air museum set in the 19th century. Situated along the Wolastoq (Saint John River), a visit to Kings Landing will bring you back in time as you explore this village full of costumed characters, farm animals, gardens and 70 historic buildings featuring over 90,000 artefacts. Enjoy a traditional or modern lunch at the onsite King's Head Inn.

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

If you're flying internationally, land in Halifax, NS or Montreal, QC and enjoy the beautiful foliage, coastal scenery, and natural beauty on your drive to New Brunswick. Alternatively, you may enjoy a relaxing overnight journey to our province as VIA Rail Canada whisks you away on "The Ocean", a train route from Montreal, QC to New Brunswick.

New Brunswick has excellent highways and is positioned conveniently between Nova Scotia, Quebec, Prince Edward Island, and Maine, making it a highly accessible destination by automobile for travelers visiting those areas. New Brunswick is also a popular cruise destination.
